The Volatility Factor (VF) means there is a possibility for the fund in generating an upside return or downside return around this VF. The Volatility Class (VC) is assigned by Lipper based on quintile ranks of the VF for qualified funds. The VF is subject to monthly revisions and the VC is revised every six months or other intervals as advised by FIMM. The volatility banding for the "Very Low", "Low", "Moderate", "High" and "Very High" VCs as at 31 March 2024 are $0.000 \leq VF \leq 3.785$, $3.785 < VF \leq 8.390$, $8.390 < VF \leq 10.990$, $10.990 < VF \leq 14.400$ and VF more than 14.400 respectively. For this period to 30 June 2024, the VCs for the funds are based on the VFs of the respective funds as at 31 March 2024. The fund's portfolio may have changed since this date and there is no guarantee that the fund will continue to have the same VF or VC in the future. Presently, only funds launched in the market for at least 36 months will display the VF and its VC.
